Questions for Application and Fellowship

### MY STORY

1. Reviewing the year 2019, how have you grown in your walk with the Lord? What experiences have you had that brought you closer to the Lord? What doctrines of Scripture have become clearer? What weaknesses have been addressed?

### QUICK REVIEW

The LORD summoned Isaiah into the prophetic office at a critical time in Israel’s history. After more than five decades of godly leadership, Uzziah’s 52 year reign ended in an ignoble way (2 Chronicles 26). Meanwhile, the evil Assyrians were rising in power. It was a time of national heartache, tragedy and fear. At this time, Isaiah saw the Lord for the benefit of us all.

## DIGGING DEEPER

1. The death of Uzziah began a time of instability and uncertainty for the southern kingdom of Judah. What concerns do the American people of our day have? Where might the followers of Jesus Christ have growing concern and fear in our day and age?
2. The Lord was seated on the throne, and that throne was located in the temple. What is the significance of this? How does it encourage your heart that Christ is both king and priest?
3. According to verse 2, the angels covered their faces and their feet in the presence of the LORD. Why do you think they did this? How does it reflect on the level of reverence in American society? In the contemporary church?
4. Reflect on the angelic statement of God's character in verse 3. Who are they declaring these truths to? What does it mean that God is holy, holy, holy? Where do you see his glory revealed upon the earth He created?
5. Isaiah had an experience of personal, spiritual and moral collapse as described in verse 5. What area felt especially sinful to Isaiah? Why do you think he felt especially stained in this aspect of his existence? (Luke 6:43-45; James 3:5-11).
6. Read Hebrews 9:23-28. What has Christ done that we might enter the presence of God with confidence?
